The college, situated in the heart of Jashore town, is one of the oldest and leading educational institutions in the southwestern part of Bangladesh.

In the backdrop of the golden jubilee celebration of Bangladesh's independence and the birth centenary of the Father of the Nation, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, we humbly remember the valiant freedom fighters and all the men and women who sacrificed so much to free us from the shackles of Pakistani tyranny. We pay our deepest respect to the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman who led us in our struggle for freedom and to all our national leaders who laid the foundations of an independent nation.

The premier objective of this Sub-project is to upgrade the teaching-learning environment with a view to ensuring quality education and creating skilled human resources, which will meet the development needs of the country. However, it is a challenge for the educational institution to ensure adequate space in the classrooms, trained and skilled teachers, transport facilities, and technological assistances and so forth. College Education Development Project (CEDP) is providing its relentless support to enhance these facilities of the college.

Our college has successfully completed six packages undertaken by the CEDP amid the pandemic situation. The IDG Sub-project team at this college has prepared the annual report for FY 2020-21 and their activities are going on in full swing. It is expected that the implementation of the packages will definitely result in positive impact on the college's academic ambience.

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CHAPTER-1: INTRODUCTION

On the 17th of July 1967, under the leadership of the then MNA Mr Sardar Ahammad Ali and through the sincere efforts of a number of education lovers and philanthropists, Jashore City College got established. With Higher Secondary and Degree Pass courses in place, Honours graduation course in Political Science under Rajshahi University was introduced in 1974. Then, in 1985 Honors graduation course in Bangla was launche

The special interest shown by the new teachers of that time, with the efforts of Professor Md Yakub and on special recommendation of the then state minister for Labor and Manpower, Mr Khaledur Rahman Tito, the college was nationalized in 1987. Gradually, honors and master's course for other subjects were introduced in the college.

It is during the tenure of Professor Ronojit Kumar Ghosh that the Shahid Minar and the Independence Monument were built. His role in various development works including the raising of the college approach road level is unforgettable. Soon after taking over, Principal Professor Selina Yasmin made all arrangements to make the college's website dynamic and keep the portal updated in order to bring momentum into all the college-related activities. Principal Professor Abu Torab Md Hassan set up multimedia classrooms to apply ICT in teaching. He also made arrangements to train the teachers for this purpose. He formed vigilance teams consisting of the teachers to keep up the college's congenial academic atmosphere and also ensured the holding of all the classes as per the routine.

Professor Md. Ashraf-ud-daulla took office on 08/02/2021 amid closure of educational institutes across the country. He took all the necessary measures to run academic classes online by using social media during this period. As soon as the ban lifted on the in-person class, he restored it in line with the DSHE directions. Besides, he took necessary steps so that the college could have an academic building constructed on its campus. Apart from that, the ongoing works under IDG sub-project led by Professor Md. Ashraf-ud-daulla is underway with a satisfactory pace.

Presently around 9,000 students are studying in this college. The college is currently running on its own glory. From higher secondary level to master's twenty departments of which honors in 12, masters in 07 courses are being taught. Some 78 learned academic are devoting their talent to

serve about ten thousand students and the nation as well. Huge co-curriculum activities are taken place every year in this college with annual sport competitions, cultural programs, activities of BNCC, Rover Scouts, Red Crescent operations visible. In addition, celebration of nationally important days such the International Mother Language Day, birthday anniversary of Bangabandhu and Children's Day, Independent Day, the Victory Day are celebrated through different cultural programs.

It is everybody's hope that as a best college of this region Jashore Govt. City College will be spreading light in all fields including quality education, sports and cultural programs.

Sculpture: Cheroo Unnoto Sheer

A beautiful sculpture, located near the main gate of the college presenting all the movements of the country from 1952 to 1971 with numerically symbolic expressions. Khondakar Sculptor Md. Badrul Islam designed this sculpture which was inaugurated later on 08 January, 2008. The height of the sculpture is approximately 27 feet from the base to the National flag's top point.

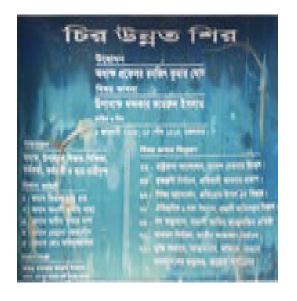
The open book placed on the altar sheds light of knowledge and inspires students to make them conscious about their rights.

1952's Language Movement has been represented by the symbol "52". Language Movement began in 1948 and reached its climax in the killing of 21 February 1952, and ended in the adoption of Bangla as one of the state languages. Election of 1954 is presented by "54". This election was held in East Bengal



between 8 and 12 March 1954, the first since Pakistan became an independent country in 1947. The opposition United Front led by the Awami League and Krishak Sramik Party won a landslide victory with 223 of the 309 seats.

Education movement of 1962 is presented by "62" on the sculpture. Equality in education is a necessary precondition for any democracy. Struggle for equality in education had paved the way for our liberation and the birth of Bangladesh in 1971. The vast inequality between East and Pakistan was not only manifested in economic policies but also in national education policy. On September 17, 1962, students took to street vehemently opposing inter-colonial Pakistani government's unequal and exclusionary national education policy, a policy that was built on the assumption that education for all is a utopian idea. It encouraged commercialization of public education.



Six points movement of 1966 has been presented by "66". The six-point demand marks a unique and an important change of course in the annals of our history and thus is a milestone event in Bangladesh. It was a movement in the-then East Pakistan, spearheaded by Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, which called for greater autonomy for East Pakistan. The movement's main agenda was to realize the six demands put forward by a coalition of Bengali nationalist political parties in 1966, to end the exploitation of East Pakistan by the West Pakistani rulers. It is considered a turning-point on the road to Bangladesh's independence. 1970 General election is presented by "70". It was held in Pakistan on 7 December 1970 to elect members of the National

Assembly. The result was a victory for the Awami League, which gained an absolute majority, winning 160 of the 162 general seats and all seven women's seats in East Pakistan.

Bangladesh's independent movement is presented "71" scribed on the sculpture. The Bangladesh Liberation War, also known as the Bangladesh War of Independence, or simply the Liberation War in Bangladesh, was a revolution and armed conflict sparked by the rise of the Bengali nationalist and self-determination movement in erstwhile East Pakistan which resulted in the independence of Bangladesh.

SHAHEED MINAR

A Shaheed Minar on the north-eastern corner of the college is campus is situated. Students and people from different areas of Jashore pay tributes to the martyrs of the 1952 historic Language Movement marking 'Amar Ekushey', the Language Martyrs Day and International Mother Language Day every year. This is also the meeting place of the students of the college.



BANGHUBANDU CORNER AT CENTRAL LIBRARY

Banghubandu Corner at Central library always declare the history of Bengali Nationalism and heritage. Students and history lovers often throng here and dig into the past by reading historic documents.

The corner has five hundred books, most of which are concerning Bangabandhu. Apart from that, its collection includes other books related to the 1971 War of Independence, religion, literature, and academics.

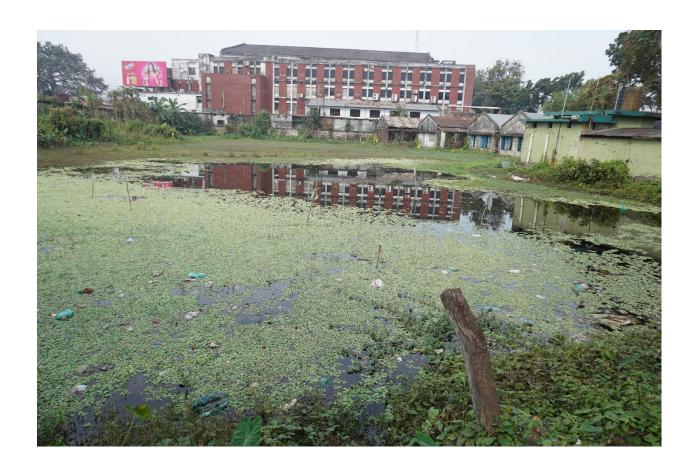

Governance and Teaching Structure

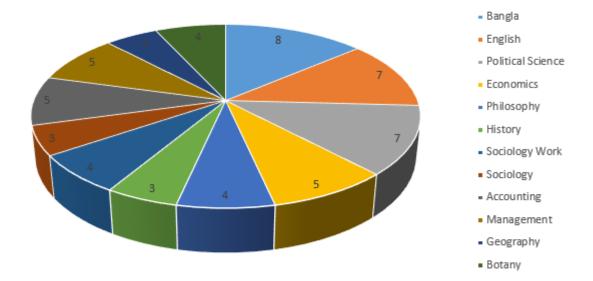

No of teachers by Departments

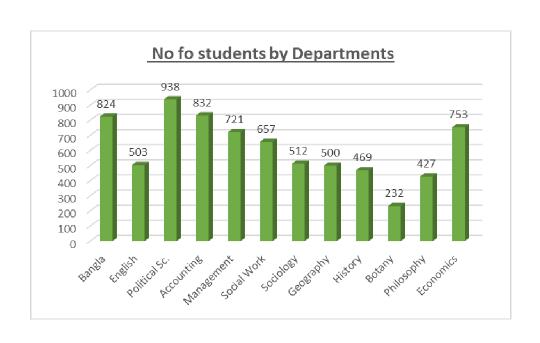

Number of Students in Honors Courses by Subjects: 2020-21

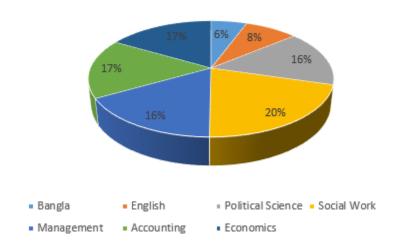

 controlling themselves and regulate their emotions, thoughts and behavior in the face of
 temptations and impulses as it is an executive function, it is necessary for achieving
 specific goals.

Key Achievements and Highlights of the Year of the Departments

12 out of 20 departments of the college individually arranged webinars focusing on academic issues and commemorating the centenary birth anniversary of the father of the nation, Bngabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. Due to COVID-19 situation, all the departments continued their academic activities through virtual platform.

Highlights of Student Activities of the Year

Academic:

• Classroom Performance: Classroom performance is an example of student response system. It is the key of learning. It allows the students to take part actively in the process of learning. Still our students are less inquisitive, but we have been trying to encourage

- them asking questions which is most important factor of inquisitiveness. And students are gradually responding to this system. We have succeeded a lot in doing so.
- Sitting for examinations (Internal/External): Sitting for examination is the conventional feedback of learning system. Though it is directly related to the academic recognition, students are very keen to attend all kinds of feedback on examination performance.

Extra-curricular Activities:

- Sports: Cannot be arranged due to the pandemic situation.
- Cultural Activities: Cannot be arranged due to the pandemic situation.
- Social Activities: The Red Crescent arranged a blood donation camp in the last fiscal year. They also distributed warm clothes and blankets among the poor people in the last winter. Rover Scouts, Rangers and BNCC unit also play roles to keep the campus clean once a month, take part disciplinary activities and marchpast during the celebration of the national days.
- Civic Engagement: in the last year, our students volunteered in some social awareness programs like health, human rights, enfranchisement and eve teasing issues.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS AND HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR OF INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRANTS (IDG)

During the period of FY 2020-21, IDG Sub-project team has successfully completed six packages. This are supply of Desktop, Laptop, Printer, Scanner and Accessories for Sub-project Office(G-01) worth Tk. 4,25,000, Procurement of AC for Sub-Project Office (G-02) worth Tk. 88,200, Furniture & Fixtures for Sub-project Office (G-03) worth Tk. 2,20,200, Sound System for class room (G-04) worth Tk. 4,92,000, Books and Journals for seminar library (G-05) worth Tk. 4,94,985.00 and IDG Sup-Project Office Room Refurbishment (W-02) worth Tk. 1,81,950 totaling to Tk. 1,902,335. Closure of college due to Corona virus impeded progress of project works during this year. In addition, college received 34 units desktop under central procurement process worth Tk. 23,81,156.03.

IDG SUB-PROJECT PROJECT OFFICE

Project office was equipped with modern amenities by the products purchased by G-01, G-02, G-03 and W-02. Now it has become a dynamic workstation and hub of the project activities. Modern furniture with desks, file cabinet, chair, air conditioner has been placed in the project office. Three desktop, two laptop, one scanner and two printers have been procured for office room.

AC was installed and interior decoration has given a new look, creating congenial ambience for the project workers.





PROCURING SOUND SYSTEM

Package no. G-04 was made for procuring sound system for college room, multifunctional lab and supporting college's cultural program held on national days and other cultural programs. Most of the class room are housed by more than 200 students. Without modern sound system, it was quite impossible for the students to follow lecture provided by a teacher in a crowded learner. Installation of this sound system has eased this problem. Students are now comfortable enough to follow tutor's speech even sitting back of the classroom. On other hand, college would have to hire sound system from market with high fare on national days and other cultural programs. Now, the high-quality sound system with gigantic speaker box has made this program resilient and college has got rid of from paying fares



PROCURING BOOKS AND JOURNALS

Package no. G-05 was taken for procuring books and journals for central library, all the honors and masters departments, multifunctional lab and Banghubandhu corner. Some 1610 books and journals were procured through this package. After distributing them, library and Banghubandhu corner have been enriched and students are getting more books than ever before.



CENTRAL PROCUREMENT

The sub-project has also extended its operating by joining central procurement program carried out by IDG procurement central team. Under this package in the FY 2020-21, IDG college team received 34 units of desktop computers aiming to install at multifunctional lab on the second floor of Academic Building of the college. Following the setting up these computers, students and teacher would get extended facility on enhancing their ICT skills.



CHAPTER-04: TEACHERS' SKILL DEVELOPMENT

Overview of Teaching Force of the College
